

Review of End User List

The Ministry of Economy, Trade and Industry (METI) has issued the End User List providing exporters with information on entities belonging to foreign countries of remaining concern over development and other conducts of weapons of mass destruction and other items, for the purpose of enhancing the effectiveness of the catch-all control* on cargoes and other loads relating to weapons of mass destruction and other items. METI has hereby revised the End User List based on the latest information.

*Catch-all control is a system that obliges exporters to submit an application for an export license for goods that may be used for the development of weapons of mass destruction even if they are not subject to export restrictions under international agreements.

For the purpose of enhancing the effectiveness of the catch-all control, entities involved in weapons of mass destruction-related and ballistic missile-related programs have been added to the End User List this time. The information on the added entities in the attached revised list is as follows.

- entity given as No. 450 (newly added entity)
- entities given as No. 309 and No. 334 (newly added AKA: Also Known As)

As a result of this review of the End User List, the revised list contains 450 entities. In accordance with the public notification of Ministry of Foreign Affairs of Japan promulgated on February 6, 2013 based on the United Nations Security Council (UNSC) Resolution 2087, this review has been enforced with reference to the public notification.

For the purpose of enhancing the effectiveness of the catch-all control, the End User List provides exporters with information on entities belonging to foreign countries of remaining concern over development and other conducts of weapons of mass destruction and other items. If the user of the cargoes and other items to be exported is found in the List, exporters

must submit an application for an export license except in the case where it is evident that those cargos and other items are not used for the development and other conducts of weapons of mass destruction. The list has been issued every year since the catch-all control was introduced in April 2002.
